He writes grants and conducts fundraising for ongoing support of a weekly medical clinic and the school operating budget. Grants written include school and clinic reconstruction, computers, and reforestation. He provides ongoing support for community members entering the medical field including two nurses who have completed their training and one current medical student.
